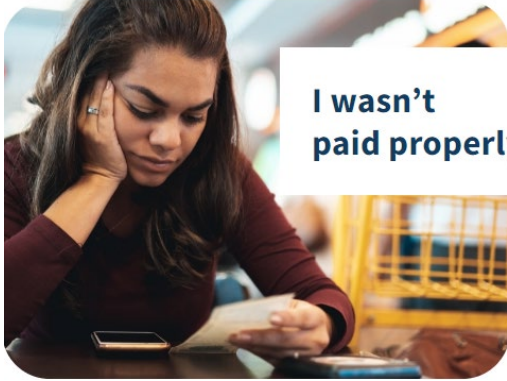

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration is committed to assuring safe and healthful working conditions for workers by setting and enforcing standards and by providing training, outreach, education, and assistance. You have a right to a safe and healthy workplace regardless of your immigration status.

unfairly**

The right to protections against discrimination.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission enforces Federal laws that make it illegal to discriminate against an applicant or employee due to a person's race, color, religion, sex (including pregnancy, gender identity, and sexual orientation), national origin, age (40 or older), disability, or genetic information.

The Office of Federal Contract Compliance Program protect workers, promote diversity and enforce the law. OFCCP holds those who do business with the federal government (contractors and subcontractors) responsible for complying with the legal requirement to take affirmative action and not discriminate based on race, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, religion, national origin, disability, or status as a protected veteran. In addition, contractors and subcontractors are prohibited from discharging or otherwise discriminating against applicants or employees who inquire about, discuss or disclose their compensation or that of others, subject to certain limitations. **OFCCP 1-800-397-6251 (TTY 1-877-889-5627) www.dol.gov/ofccp**
